The magnificent

LLANDOVERY BEAT LLANDYBIE IN

Llandovery RFC displaying siftness of foot, slightness of hand and a real sense of history carried off the trophy donated in their honour in a magnificent seven-a-side tournament on Monday.

They overcame early frights against Amman United and their own second team, thinly disguised as Cilycwm, to win the centenary sevens in fine style over a valiant Llandybie outfit.

Indeed, Llandybie's semifinal victory over Swansea Athletic may rank as the finest performance of the day, but there was no taking it away from Llandovery on the occasion of the first event

of their centenary season.

That the host side should have had the talents of people like the Williams brothers at like the Williams brothers at their disposal on such a historic occasion may be look-ed upoh, especially by the teams they beat, as a for-tunate coincidence. Llan-dovery may consider it a happy one. But in the end there was no denying that they were the best team on show show

And it was fitting that a team celebrating its one hundredth birthday should come up trumps on what was after all, their day.

Victory had, however, look-ed a long way off when they had struggled to beat Amman United and their own team mates, who were drafted in at the last moment when Llandello had failed to turn in the early group up, in matches.

A home victory was made to look all the more remote by the performances of Mumbles and Swansea Athletic in group four.

SUPERIOR

Both these sides had looked superior to everybody early on but as the rare luxury of a sunny afternoon wore on there was evidence from several local sides that the Swansea boys may not have

everything sown up.
In group two, Ammanford had a clean sweep of victories including one memorable one over the South Glamorgan Institute (Cardiff College) who, while not being the strongest outfit that the seat of learning could put out, were a strong one none the

Ammanford skipper, Gwynlais Williams, opened the scoring with a nice try and the scoring with a nice try and the lead was increased before half-time by an Arwyn Fisher penalty. The Guardian's own Clive James grabbed an opportunist try early in the second-half to increase the lead to eleven points.

Phil Hamer's excellent try for the institute came too late

for the institute came too late to save them in that game. But the Trebanos winger

helped to put pressure on Ammanford by getting a cou-ple of the college's nine tries against Cefneithin in a 44-0 trouncing.

However, Ammanford got over a littery start against Penygroes, to run out 22-18 winners and not have to worry about tries scored.

If West Wales matches were decided on aggregate, then the two midweek fixtures between Llandello and Llandovery would have resulted in a 12-all draw, and there certainly could have been no fairer result.

The closeness of the first match in Llandybie was carried through to Llandovery last week, with both teams coming close to scoring, but failing at crucial moments in an exciting, if a little loose, first half. first half.
