THE MOST remarkable feature of an otherwise undistinguished C. C. Evans cup final was the fact that Llandovery, who received about 80 per cent use of the ball, Llandovery. who received about 80 per cent use of the ball, failed to convert this possession into points and were beaten by a Clive Roderick drop-goal.

The game was only minutes old when Gareth Williams missed a good chance to put his side in front when his penalty went low and to the left of the posts.

The Llandovery backs tested Llandybic captain and full-back Darrel Edwards with a succession of high balls but Edwards looked solid and his clearances repeatedly found touch.

The Llandovery cause was not helped by an injury to number eight Nigel Clark who was forced to leave the field on the half-hour. He returned briefly but was replaced at the interval by Martin Phillips.

During the entire match Llandy-bie gave an object lesson in defen-sive play, producing some superb tackles and cover. The handling of scrum-half Lyn Davies occasionally looked suspect but this he more than compensated for with some fine clearance kicks from tight situations.

But the Llandovery backs, par-ticularly fly-half Alan Morgan showed a tendency to kick instead of passing the ball out, much to the exasperation of their large band of supporters.

DROP GOAL

Ten minutes were left when Llandybie were awarded a penalty to the left of the Llandovery posts. Clive Roderick, who just before the match had been chosen to lead the side next season, elected to try a drop goal, and succeeded in puting his team almost unbelievably, in front.

Liandovery seemed to lose heart after this blow and the Llandybie forwards were operating far more efficiently towards the end of the match, but Llandovery still could have saved the match in the last seconds when Llandybie were penalised.

Elwyn Davies, the visitors outside half, opened the scoring. He received good ball from a scrum 35 metres out and dropped a goal.



They came close to increasing their lead just after half time, when centre Ian Goslin's drop goal attempt went narrowly wide.




