Blood and thunder battle

WHILE the phoney war goes on between the reserves of top Anglo and Welsh clubs this was a real rugby battle brimming with blood-and-thunder action.

Tackles that would make a brick wall quake and with both sides showing true grit and determination, league rugby roared back with a bang yesterday that will not reach the first division clubs until after the World Cup.

In a game marred and ultimately affected by the sending off of Rumney lock Paul Regan for stamping after 30 minutes, third division champions of last season Llandovery started with a crucial away win . . . in the third division.

The confusion is caused by the name changes in the league — taking out the premier tag from a top flight which hardly merited it — but the West Wales side could manage the unique achievement of being third division champions two seasons running if they can claim such notable scalps as this.

In the end the game turned on a moment of class from a class player, with Llandovery working former Llanelli and Wales wing Carwyn Davies into a one-on-one situation with just five minutes left in the match.

A player of his ability needed no more than a half chance as he shrugged off opposite number Paul StClair and strolled into the corner to clinch victory.





The Boot Of 'Caws' Is Llandovery's Saviour

On a bright sunny afternoon at Church Bank, last Saturday, Llandovery went perilously close to surrendering their unbeaten home record in the Heineken League which now goes back two seasons (writes John Augustus).

Mid-way through the second half and trailing 15 points to 13 against visitors Mountain Ash, who with their confidence boosted and their forwards on the rampage, it looked pretty ominous at one time that the writing was on the wall for Llandovery.

However drawing on all their physical reserves the home side showed their mettle. Fighting back courageously, and with their loyal fans encouraging them all the way, Llandovery were in no mood to capitulate, not even to the Bookmakers' pre-season favourites to win the Division Three championship.

Hitting back decisively when the chips were down they forced Mountain Ash to concede two vital penalties and up stepped their trump card, the cool and calculated outside half, Carwyn Williams, to slot over both long distance kicks to snatch a dramatic 19 pts. to 15 victory. It was a classic case of "Cometh the hour, Cometh the man."

It was typical "Boys Own" stuff. For Llandovery, anyway, it was an exciting and fitting climax to a wonderful match, which throughout its duration was a titanic struggle, to say the least.

While the personal glory went to skipper Williams — known as "Caws" to all and sundry — he would be the first to concede Llandovery is no "one man band".

The outside half, who has been a match winner many times in the past is the link-man around which the side has been built, nevertheless, Llandovery is a team in the truest sense with every man collectively having his own equal contribution to make.

In each match there are always outstanding individual performances. The previous week it was Dai Giles, who was "on song," while last weekend it was his back row colleague, Elfin Jenkins, who stole the limelight. What a human dynamo he is — Welsh equivalent of "Stormin Norman" if one is permitted to draw a comparison between a soldier and a sportsman. And another player to catch the eye was prop Dai Thomas. The power of the local policeman in the set scrums put his opposite number in

as a consequence the present weaknesses must be eliminated.

And so to the nitty gritty of Saturday's encounter. Llandovery got off to the perfect start, being six points ahead in the opening minute, An attempted defensive clearance by Mountain Ash was charged down and from the resulting loose play Elfin Jenkins emerged to cross the line and Carwyn Williams converted.

Llandovery had two further opportunities to press home their advantage in the first quarter but "Caws" screwed the ball on the wrong side of both uprights from almost identical kicking positions.

Full back Hywel Jones was then entrusted with the next goal-kicking attempt from wide out on the right, but he too failed to find the target.

Before the interval though Llandovery were not to be denied another score. After being entrenched on the visitors line, and three unsuccessful attempts to gain a push-over try, the home side changed their tactics with scrumhalf Adrian Davies whipping out a quick pass and some slick handling was rounded off by Coles scoring in the corner.

With a 10 points lead at half-time Llandovery were in a relatively comfortable position — although not in a commanding one. Realising that they would have to strike quickly to get back into the game and thus deprive the home side of establishing a matchwinning supremacy — Mountain Ash did just that.

And the man who put them back into game with a vengeance was flanker Hugh Morse. Despite a number of defenders trying to haul him down, Morse managed to hurl himself over the line and with fly-half Chris Conway converting the scene was set for a battle royal.

There was temporary respite for Llandovery when Williams landed a long range penalty, but Mountain Ash had by no means shot their bolt. They came storming back with Conway putting over a perfectly struck drop goal.

Rocked back on their heels by the tenacity of the visitors rugged but effective play, Llandovery conceded a gift score. Hywel Jones taking his eye off the ball as it was passed back to him by Coles, dropped it in his own 22, and Mountain Ash took full advantage of the error with lo-4 Adrian Davies, a huge man, crashing over. Conway again added the extra points.

the front row under intense pressure throughout the game. And another always prominent, especially in the mauls, was lock Wyn Williams, whose ripping of the ball away from the oppostion was reminiscent of Geoff Wheel at his best.

Fuelled by this latest success and leading 13-15 the visitors exerted tremendous pressure but somehow Llandovery weathered the storm and clawed their way back, With a quarter of an hour remaining, Carwyn Williams put his side in front once more with a 40 metre penalty. And minutes later Williams did a repeat performance to ease Llandovery in to a four points lead.

The final 10 minutes were nailbiting to say the least but with grim determination Llandovery hung-on denying their opponents any share of the spoils which they might well have felt entitled to. So with World Cup Rugby

taking centre stage for the remainder of October, Heineken League games take a back seat for a month. Llandovery now have to wait until November 9th, before League action resumes with a visit to Narberth, who demolished Bonymaen 36-8 last Saturday.

Meanwhile everyone down at Church Bank can look back with satisfaction to the way the season has gone so far. Winning all their matches up to now, they enjoy 100 per cent records with Blaina and Tenby. Now they have to wait patiently for the season to begin in earnest again.




