Llandovery puiled off something of a pre season coup when they lifted their own centenary seven a side trophy.

And they will, of course, be looking to keep on pulling them off throughout the new season in Section C, but the atmosphere during the league season will be a little different to that "let's have a good time" attitude most teams adopt in sevens.

Mr. Roland J. Griffiths, the club secretary, agrees that the club's performances in the pre season sevens tournaments have already made the season a memorable one. And he explains that last week's trial match suggested that with the youngsters that made up much of their team last year still present, and a few new forwards on the scene, Llandovery may, at last, be able to stop their yo-yoing between Sections D and C.

"I would be happy if the team can stay in Section C this year", said Mr. Griffiths, not putting too much emphasis on the climb to section B. "It would be nice to see us simply consolidate our position, but promotion would be a nice bonus," he added.

Aside from their championship matches, Llandovery also have a number of special matches planned. They play Nuneaton on September 20. Mr. Griffiths explained that ex-Llandovery man, John Davies is fixture secretary there. And on October 1 they take on Maesteg under lights.

Club celebrates 100 years of rugby

in the town

LLANDOVERY RFC celebrating their centenary season opened proceedings in fine style on August 26 by winning their sevens tournament against some stiff opposition.

It took a certain amount of determination to overcome early frights against Amman United and to end up in the final against Llandybie, but Llandovery RFC are no slouches when it comes to determination.

The history of the

The history of the Welsh Rugby Union will show that rugby football was played at Llandovery of the was played at Indinderd years ago and the centenary celebrations, perhaps belatedly, commemorate the anniversary of playing rugby in the town.

playing rugby in the town.

Controversy exists as to how rugby was first brought to the area. Some say it was the strong links established between Oxford and Cambridge Universities resulted in the game being brought West, whilst others suggest the cattle drovers were responsible.

It is true that the college had established links with the universities in so much as many masters obtained their degrees there.

Similarly, Llandovery was an important stopping point for the drovers, who moved cattle from all parts of West Wales during the middle part of the 19th Century, who took in such notable early centres of rugby as Blackheath and indeed Rugby itself.

One drover gave vivid descriptions of the game as it was played at Blackneath. It is clear, however, that the game

was not welcomed with wholen be arted enthusiasm—a strong puritan element in the town objected to this "barbaric pastime." So as not to offend the town's inhabit out to growe was inhabitants the game was often played by moonlight in "Cae Glas y bwci" a field near the

Unfortunately the early Unfortunately the early club records were lost in the flood of 1926 and since the Welsh Rugby Union do not have records of the pre-1892 era some controversy has arisen over the exact time rugby was first played by the town's residents.

It is likely that the

residents.

It is likely that the origin of rugby football in Llandovery will remain just as much a mystery as the origin of the games of rugby itself.

One of the first local newspaper reports of a

newspaper reports of a game involving local residents is dated March

23, 1877. The match was played between Carmarthenshire Rovers and Llandovery College. The report shows that the

The report shows that the Rovers were a combined team with players from Carmarthen, Llandeilo, Llanelli and Llandovery. The Llandovery players were: A Rees, W Morgan. D Jones, H Williams and G Thomas. While this is not specific reference to a Llandovery Town side it indicates that at least five individuals were postitively identified as Llandovery Town players.

Llandovery Town players.
Llandovery was represented at the inaugural meeting of the Welsh Rugby Union at the Castle Hotel, Neath on March 12, 1881. The town that evening was represented by C P Lewis, later to be capped, who was a master at Llandovery College.
The records show he did not play for the college in the school game against Brecon, during this time.
The clubs represented

The clubs represented on that historic occasion were Bangor, Brecon,

Cardiff, Lampeter, Llanelli, Llandeilo, Llandovery, Merthyr, Newport, Pontypool and Swansea. These teams have become regarded as the founder members of the WRU and were recently presented with plaques from the WRU commemorating the commemorating the

commemorating the occasion.

Any doubts regarding which team C P Lewis represented in Neath were resolved when his godson Mr Herbert Michael wrote in response to the centenary celebrations "... I am certain in my own mind celebrations ". . I am certain in my own mind that he (C P Lewis) represented the town in the first place, with of course, the interests of Llandovery College resulting therefrom."

C P Lewis represented Wales in the second

Wales in the second match they played and was a member of the first Welsh winning side in

1882. C P Lewis in all played romes for Wales C P Lewis in all played five games for Wales between 1882 and 1884, at full back. Although he captained Wales he did not take charge of the Town side. The 1885 team who played Llanelli Tuesdays was captained by D L Davies.

The Town rivals on the rugby field during the early days were the nearby towns of Llandeilo and Lampeter. Transport to Lampeter was by horse-drawn

coaches and the journey took several hours.

Llandello presented no problem from a transport point of view with the opening of the Great Western Railway link.

The Town team was a frequent contender in the Weish Cup competition during this time. The Llandovery team appeared at both St Helens and Neath against Newport and Swansea.

Records show the Town reaching the semi-finals on more than one occasion.

The rugby club of The rugby club of Llandovery has been connected with some outstanding players. Harry Watkins and Guy Morgan, who between them won 14 caps from the Llanelli and Cambridge University

clubs learnt the rudiments of the game with the Town XV.

DR Gent appeared for Liandovery as a full back before playing several games for Lianelli and then Cloucester. Guy Morgan, a nephew of the legendary Teddy Morgan who scored that most disputed of all tries against New Zealand in 1905, was the son of a local practitioner, Dr H Morgan who rendered years of service to the cause of the game in Liandovery.

Liandovery Town RFC have always made every endevour to play an open game. During the early 1900's and even up to the outbreak of World War I Liandovery continued to produce some impressive performances.

Rugby was restarted in 1920 with such players as Ben and Jack Jackson, Edgar Evans, D J Davies and Tom Lewis returning from the battlefields of France. The 1920's were difficult times, but Liandovery survived.

Due to the inability to obtain fixtures, because they were not affiliated to a Union, the club ceased to function in 1935.

In November 1947 a club was officially formed under the secretary Mr Glyn Jones. To obtain fixtures, the club was affiliated to the Lianelli and District Junior Welsh Rugby Union.

Under the captaincy of Douglas Rees the club soon became a considerable force in the area. Also involved at this time were T R Bebb, Granville Evans, Idris Perrier, Fred Manning and Ernie Prosser.

Ernie Prosser has been active in the club ever since and has been made a life member in this, the

a life member in this, the centenary year.
During the latter part of the 1952-53 season Llandovery RFC embarked on a club tour to Northumberland. This was the start of a close relationship between the club and Sigehill, who they beat 6-0, which they have retained to the

have retained to the present time.

The tour had an invigorating effect on the team because in the following season they won the Llanelli and District League

District League President's Cup. In 1956 the club bought Barlow's Field. In the subsequent two years improvements were carried out including the building of changing rooms. rooms.

rooms.

It was also in 1956 that another milestone was reached in the history of the club. The decision was made to seek membership of the WRU. It was decided by the WRU to admit the club along with four others for a three year period of probation.

In 1965 the club was admitted into the West Wales Rugby Union, which meant that the club was now committed to playing rugby at a much higher level.

In 1968-69 the club

In 1968-69 the club finished ninth out of 36

clubs a great achievement under the captaincy of Ken Richards.

In 1974-75 the championship system was changed. Four sections of ten teamsfour more clubs had been added by now each were formed by a draw with promotion and relegation.

In 1978-79 ten more clubs were added making five sections and the idea of four-up, four-down extended for a further period.

Without doubt the

Without doubt the 1979-80 season was the most successful with three notable

three notable achievements.
They won the championship final, came top of their section in the league and they beat Carmarthen Athletic Druids in the All-Winners final at

Tycroes. It was also in 1979 that It was also in 1979 that the club, with more than one side playing at home, were able to buy two fields in the close proximity to the town.

LLANDOVERY BEAT LLANDYBIE IN

Liandovery RFC displaying siftness of foot, slightness of hand and a real sense of history carried off the trophy donated in their honour in a magnificent seven-a-side tournament on Monday.

Victory had, however, looked a long way off when they had struggled to beat Amman United and their own team mates, who were drafted in at the last moment when Llandello had failed to turn up, in the early group matches.

SUPERIOR

Both these sides had looked superior to everybody early on but as the rare luxury of a sunny afternoon wore on there was evidence from several local sides that the Swansea boys may not have everything sown up.

In group two, Ammanford had a clean sweep of victories including one memorable one over the South Glamorgan Institute (Cardiff College) who, while not being the strongest outfit that the seat of learning could put out, were a strong one none the less.

Ammanford skipper, Gwynlais Williams, opened the scoring with a nice try and the lead was increased before half-time by an Arwyn Fisher penalty. The Guardian's own Clive James grabbed an opportunist try early in the second-half to increase the lead to eleven points.

Phil Hamer's excellent try for the institute came too late to save them in that game.

And then the crowd were witness to a remarkable match between the "Cwms."

Cwmllynfell shot away to a 12 point lead with tries by Mike Lewis and Wynford Jones, both of which Lewis converted.

However, in the second half, seventeen-year-old Huw Williams staged a one man show to rob Cwmllynfell of victory. He scored three excellent tries and converted them himself to make the final score 18-12 to Cwmgors.

Neither team could maintain consistency though and suffered at the hands of either Swansea or Mumbles. In the end, it was Swansea who went through thanks to their total of 13 tries to Mumbles' eleven.


Llandovery R.F.C.'s centenary season got off to a flying start at the weekend with the club taking part in two widely differing






Gareth Davies crosses for Llandovery's second try in the WWRU championship final against New Dock Stars. Looking on
