



liams, who injured an ankle earlier in the game, leave the field. His line-out work had been a mainstay of the first half and Llandovery hearts missed a beat.


But Carwyn Williams set hopes soaring again with a successful drop-goal from a free kick inside the Pontypridd 22-metre line just two minutes later
