

Carwyn set to make exit

Llangadog farmer Carwyn Davies is quitting first-class rugby, with his imminent marriage and increasing work commitments now occupying his attention.

26-year old Carwyn is adamant that his decision is final, even though Llanelli have been reluctant to acknowledge the loss of such a talented player, and have until this week been attempting to brief the flying winger with new training schedules for next season.

He says that people outside farming simply fail to appreci-

parents, he will find himself reponsible for 110 acres and the daily milking of 70 cattle. Carwyn says that in total there are over 100 cattle on the farms, and he's often found himself working from 6am to 6pm, and facing a training session at 6.30!.

He's also faced a 27-mile drive hime from Stradey, and with the all- enveloping farm duties he's about to undertake, he needs to be almost constantly on the spot. Carwyn says the decision to go has no bearing on his exit from the Welsh squad after his injury problems in early

February, saying that the time is now simply right to bow out.

He also says that he has no thoughts of turning out occasionally for any club at a lower level, and leaves with few if any regrets, saying he couldn't possibly have played for a better club than Llanelli, and also treasuring his four Welsh caps.

leaves Davies achievement in the club record books that could remain for many seasons, having two seasons ago set a try-scoring record of 45 to pass Andy Hill's total of 39. In total, he played 158 times for 554 Llanelli, scoring points including 121 tries, and was the highest scorer in the club's 89-90 campaign.

CHAMPIONS

LAST in, first out was Llandovery's motto this season. The final club to qualify for leagues turned the form book upside down by emerging as champions.

Now they are set to go one better by sweeping through the third division (as it will be called) to join the likes of Dunvant and Llanharan among Welsh rugby's elite.

After finishing fifth in the West Wales cham-

After finishing fifth in the West Wales championship the season before, Llandovery earned their chance by the narrowest of margins.

The clubs who have done well on the field in the bottom two divisions have also been the ones with the best set up off it. Llandovery, with new facilities and a superb clubhouse built by the community, certainly have that.

They also have top English coach Stan Liptrot, whose ideas did not go down at all well at Maesteg, but have seen a blossoming of Llandovery where he is allowed a free rein.

"I had never before agreed to take over a side without having seen them play, but the gamble was certainly worthwhile with Llandovery," he explained.

"They are prepared to seek excellence, and don't use a nail when a screw is needed.

"Certainly we are confident looking ahead. We class ourselves alongside Dunvant, and see no reason why we should not follow their success."

Liptrot has brought into their rugby management the everyday principles used in

business

"Creating the right environment makes one hell of a difference. In business you try to have zero defects, and translated into rugby that means zero penalties," explained Liptrot.

"So we do things such as analysing who gives penalties away, and why, and in one league game we only conceded two penalties which is pretty good going.

"The number of points we gave away is lower than everyone else in any of the leagues apart from Newport, who played four games fewer, and Dunvant by three points."

IT'S BACK to league action for most local rugby clubs after last week's cup and friendly matches.

In the Heineken League Llandovery travel to Kidwelly hoping to carry on where they left off in their last league match when they beat Tumble.

For the first time this season former Llanelli wing and Church Bank favourite, Carwyn Davies, will be eligible to play in a league match.








