Tumble can't stop

Drovers

Llandovery 6 Tumble 3

LLANDOVERY again stretched their lead at top of the Heineken League third division with a hard fought win over their great rivals Tumble.

On a day when most people would have preferred to be sitting at home in front of a warm fire, a large crowd turned out to see this thrilling game, which was still in the balance right up to the final whistle.

Tumble won the toss and chose to play into the teeth of the gusting wind and were prepared to defend for much of the first half.

In fact they defended so well, the league leaders could only cross their line once, and that followed a cruel bounce of the ball.

Carwyn Williams kicked ahead, and as the ball bounced it changed direction completely deceiving the Tumble defence.

Huw Thomas was first to react by gathering the ball and sending a try scoring pass out to Eirain Jones. Carwyn Williams converted.

Llandovery failed to increase their lead by halftime and there were doubts whether the six point deficit would be enough to bring them victory.

The home forwards had other ideas and they adopted the tactics which brought New Zealand a hard fought victory in similar conditions against Llanelli.

The Drovers kept the ball away from Tumble for long periods, and when Tumble kicked the Llandovery backs ran back strongly.

It was an outstanding performance, with Wyn Williams winning linesout and then charging upfield, encouraging his team mates.

Llandovery depended on the rolling maul and attacking around the fringes of rucks and mauls. Man of the match, number eight David Giles, did this to great effect from scrums, sucking in the back row and halfbacks.

Outside-half Jarred

Outside-half Jarred Davies gave his side some hope when he landed a penalty mid-way through the second half.

And it was the freescoring kicker who had the final throw of the dice when he tried to level matters with a drop goal in the final minute.

But to the obvious disappointment of the Magpie supporters the ball just drifted outside the post.

The match leaves Llandovery five points clear at the top, but Tumble's performance suggests they will be able to improve on their fourth place in the league.

LLANDOVERY maintained their five point lead at the top of the Heineken League Third Division with an 18-6 win over Kidwelly.

Meanwhile Tumble kept well in touch in fourth place with a 16-7 win at home against Blackwood.

The Drovers were given a good start by their seaside opponents when they were gifted three needless penalties, which Carwyn Williams gratefully snapped up.

Williams was to grab a fourth penalty, but his most memorable contribution was a dummy which started a 70 yard movement. The ball eventually found its way into the

Heineken sides need a reminder

TUMBLE and Llandovery will have to remind themselves what Heineken League rugby is like by the time they play their next league fixtures.

Their last league games were on January 12, and because of Schweppes Cup dates, internationals and last week's postponements they don't have another scheduled Heineken match until March 9 - a two month lay-off, apart from friendlies.

Meanwhile, following last week's snow, the league management committee is looking at cutting back on the number of games played during December and January.

Committee chairman Mr John Powell said: "We were lulled into a false sense of security over the last couple of seasons with two quiet winters.

"There were hardly any games called off in recent seasons because of frozen pitches. But you just cannot predict the weather."

Mr Powell summed up the sentiments of all rugby players and followers saying: "It's immensely frustrating. Saturday afternoon is not quite a Saturday afternoon without rugby."

 Llandovery have rearranged last Saturday's cancelled match against Blackwood for March 30.

DROVERS STAY FIT

LLANDOVERY RFC found a novel way of beating the recent big freeze and keeping their players fit and supple.

The Heineken League third division leaders enlisted the help of local aerobics instructor Dawn Jones.

Coach Stan Liptrot said: "Dawn really worked the boys hard, especially trying to improve their flexibility.

"Last year she got

everyone involved in a sponsored aerobics marathon to raise money for Children In Need and she was very happy to help when the weather set it.

"We could have done without the long break. We were on a winning run and looking to maintain the momentum.

"There could be a lot of surprise results when we return to league action, depending on how well the sides have looked after themselves."

TUMBLE have not given up hope of gaining one of the two third division promotion places in the Heineken League this season.

Although the Magpies are lying fourth in the table and four points behind Tenby United, who are currently second to Llandovery, they believe a hundred per cent record in their last five games would leave them in with a chance.

One of those matches is at Tenby on March 23, and that is a match they really must win to give them any chance.

Tumble spokesman Nigel Thomas says his side's past experience in the West Wales league could help them.

He said: "We've seen to many successful late runs over the years to discount our chances yet. We've won more than one West Wales championship with a late run, although overhauling Llandovery looks unlikely."

But more immediately Tumble must meet the challenge of a home match against St Peters, who knocked them off the top of the third division back in November with a 15-9 win.

Going into that game Tumble had not conceded a try in any of their first five Heineken League matches, but a score by former Penarth wing broke their proud record. At present St Peters are lying fourth from bottom of the league.

This will be Tumble's first Heineken league match since January 12, but they have kept up their fitness with recent wins

over second division strugglers Bonymaen (24-14) and a convincing result over West Wales Section A high flyers Ystradgynlais by 29-6.

Gwendraeth Valley Comprehensive School PE master Geoff Evans has also been helping team manager Clive John keep his players in good shape.

Llandovery will be hoping their enforced lay-off, also since January 12, will not throw their charge for the championship out of its stride.

Coach Stan Liptrot says the delay due to bad weather and international dates could result in some shock results, but hopefully not at Church Bank on Saturday where Llandovery take on Pontypool United.

When the two sides met earlier in the season United managed to take a surprise lead, but Llandovery hit back with four tries which put them top of the table on try count following the 20-7 win.

Llandovery's real test is likely to come on April 6 when they entertain Tenby in what could be the clash that decides the championship.

Third placed Cilfynydd have received a blow to their promotion hopes. Their influential outside-half Paul Jones, who is a self-employed carpenter, has been forced to look for work in Birmingham and is likely to be unavailable for the rest of the season.

TUMBLE preserved their slim hopes of promotion from Heineken League Division Three thanks to a fine display by Jared Davies who scored 12 points in the 24-10 win over St Peters.

This victory sets up what should be a cracking encounter at second placed Tenby United which Tumble must win to stay in with a chance.

On Saturday Tumble fell behind to a penalty, but soon hit back when they were awarded a penalty try converted by Davies.

Then Davies converted a try of his own, before St Peters scored their only try of the match.

Arwel Davies extended Tumble's lead with another try converted by Jared Davies, St Peters kicked a penalty, but Paul Jones rounded off Tumble's scoring with another try, which Davies again converted.

Meanwhile any worries about shocks following their long lay off were dispelled by Llandovery as they maintained their three point lead at the top. Huw Thomas opened the scoring when he ran in from 30 metres for an excellent try. Carwyn Williams converted and added a penalty.

Flanker Chris Davies claimed Llandovery's second try, converted by Williams, making the final score 15-3.

On Saturday Llandovery should do better against at St Peters, who they beat 12-3 at Church Bank in November thanks to four Hywel Jones penalties.

Llandovery 0 pts Tenby 0

PROMOTION winners Llandovery and keen rivals at the top of the Third Division, Tenby United, fought out their own version of the Eton Wall game in the worst conditions that could be possibly envisaged at this time of year.

A fierce, numbing wind that whipped lateral rain across the length of a swamp-like pitch reduced this contest to a muddy, mauling battle between two well-matched packs.

It was an exercise in trench warfare with the forwards keeping the ball buried among themselves and contesting every inch of ground with riveting resolution.

Tenby came nearest to breaking the deadlock. Left wing Steve Hartland actually crossed the Llandovery line from a blind-side thrust early in the game.

As the wing crashed over in the corner, referee J G Morgan was ready to award a try until he saw the raised flag of the Tenby touch-judge for a foot in touch.

Liandovery are already assured of promotion to Division Two and Tenby are virtually there.

What remains to be decided is the Division Three championship and that will be settled by what happens next Saturday in the final matches of the Heineken League.

Llandovery are away to Kenfig Hill and Tenby are at home to Blackwood. Even if Tenby slip up without scoring a try, they can only be pipped for promotion in the unlikely event of nearest challengers Cilfynydd scoring 10 tries in the process of a home win over visiting Tumble.

"We would have liked to have tied everything up today," said Tenby team manager Tony Powling as the players rushed for steaming hot showers.

"We wanted to win it, but we couldn't ask for any more than the players gave. We are satisfied with a point."

Llandovery coach Stan Liptrot was of a similar mind. "It was a fair result," he said. "Our control in the second half was superb and they did very well in the first half.

"Both sides dictated the lines-out against the wind. That shows that the line-out always favours the side into the wind.

"It was a game where you have got to take your chances from dropped ball, but neither side looked like dropping the ball.

"The handling of the high ball in those conditions was absolutely superb."

Tenby captain Ben Childs, who won the toss, had no hesitation in playing the first half against the wind once he had heard that the referee intended to see the match go full distance.

His forwards met the challenge head-on with some magnificent close support driving play with scrum half Mike Griffiths joining them as an extra thruster and mauler.

Griffiths was outstanding, relishing the role he played in lending weight to the Tenby effort up front, which would have surely succeeded but for some equally outstanding defensive play by the home side.

During this pressure, prop and pack leader Colwyn Harts forced his way over the Llandovery line without being able to ground the

ball.

Early in the second half Griffiths almost scored in going for the corner. "If he had dived, he would have slid in," contended the Tenby team manager.

If the match had to be decided on territorial advantage, Tenby would have won it by a mile.

Even in the face of the wind, they had much the better of the contest, but it is not for nothing that Llandovery can boast the best defensive record in the division.

Little separates them otherwise. They have each scored 43 tries in 17 League matches. Both richly deserve the promotion that awaits them.



A DRAW at Kenfig Hill on Saturday will be enough to seal the Heineken League Third Division Championship for Llandovery on Saturday and earn the club an extra £500.

Llandovery are already assured a massive £5,250 after clinching promotion, but would love to enter the Second Division as champions.

Coach Stan Liptrot says: "You can't ignore the financial aspect. The prize money is a tremendous boost to our finances and if we go up as champions attracting a big sponsor would be much easier."

The title race goes to the last match of the season following the 0-0 draw in the mud against Tenby United last Satur-

day.

The draw keeps Llandovery's two point lead at the top intact, so any sort of positive result at Kenfig Hill will do.

But if Llandovery lose and Tenby beat Blackwood, the championship will be decided on try count, and going into Saturday's games both sides are locked on 43 tries each. Basically Llandovery must not lose.

Last Saturday's weather conditions were a bitter disappointment for the spectators of both side's who were hoping for a classic showdown.

It was Tenby who emerged from the quagmire to create the better chances, but Llandovery's defence stood firm.

Tumble are finishing the season on a high note, and veteran scrum-half Arwel Davies is part of the reason.

On Saturday he chipped in with a couple of tries in the 20-6 win over Kenfig Hill on Saturday.

Tumble were trailing 6-4 at the interval, but hit back with the wind behind them through tries by number eight Paul Jones, prop Martin King and Davies' second try. Jared Davies and Eurig Morgan added conversions.

On the stroke of half time a rolling maul by the Kenfig Hill pack created the platform for a try by Lyn Jenkins, which meant an interval score of Kenfig Hill, Llandovery 3.

Within minutes of the resumption the visitors had reduced the lead with a Carwyn Davies long range penalty kick.

Llandovery at last were playing to their full potential, the forwards were gaining increasing ascendancy and the resultant possession released their talented three quarters.

An incisive run by speedy wing Carwyn Davies put Llandovery into a good attacking position in the home 22.






